

# Musings from the President (No, not the new President) By Dee Elwin

#### Don't be Afraid of Competition!

While watching the Olympics, I became aware of a parallel between it, photography, and competition. Participating athletes have a passion for their sport and have put in years of training (some beginning at a very early age). This includes spending large amounts of money for equipment, trainers, coaches, facility fees, and travel. They sacrifice a great deal in time away from family and social time with friends in order to excel in their particular sport.

Photographers do much the same. We start out with a passion for our hobby. We put out money for expensive photography equipment, accessories and editing programs. We join a photo club and take advantage of workshops, classes, tutorials and photo shoots. We literally spend hours alone working on an image to get it just right.

Olympic athletes have to perform in front of judges or scoring machines. They are doing their best and when their best is not quite good enough, they (or interviewers) ask "What happened?"

Being judged by others is not for the faint of heart! We all want to be seen in a good light. When our effort is deemed not good enough, it's a blow to the ego. When

an ice skater falls during a performance, he or she immediately gets up and continues as if nothing happened. Afterwards, their coaches and others will hug and console them. Later, they will review what led to the fall and work on that particular problem. The attitude is to practice more and try again.

Isn't this true with our club's competition? When new members finally get the nerve to enter an image and receive a low score, they're devastated and embarrassed. That's natural. However, take good notes on what the judge had to say about your and other images. Learn from him or her. Judges are there to help you improve. Poly members are very generous with their knowledge and will help you if asked. Our club's purpose is to educate and learn from one another.

So, don't be afraid of competition. If you don't do well, don't go home and post your equipment on E-Bay! Find out how to get better. Listen to the judge. Ask members. Apply that advice and try again. Even long-time members will admit to receiving a 5 or 6 from a judge. It takes a long time to hone your skills – but one day, with perseverance, you'll hear that magic number – "NINE"!


Lastly, the competition totals for the February meeting were;
